Annexure 1:

Best Practice 1 : Blood and Eye Donation Camp was organised. More than 50 bottles of blood donated and more than 100 individuals registered themselves for Eye Donation.

Blood Donation is one of the most significant and noble contribution one can make to the society. It gives a chance to help other individuals who are critically ill or needing an emergent infusion to replenish their circulatory system. It's a donation, which is priceless!

Blood Donation also promotes Secularism and Unity, as the Donnie does not see the caste or religion of the Donor and vice versa. There is only one thought in the mind of the Donor, "Selfless Giving".

The Institution has carried out a Blood Donation Camp with an overwhelming response. With these kinds of initiatives, college is able to reinstate a sense of belongingness to the society, in the hearts of students and faculty members. At the end of the camp, we could witness an unprecedented satisfaction among the students.

It is worth mentioning here that, more than half the Donors were first time donors. It is an achievement in itself to be able to convince these people to Donate Blood.

Along with Blood Donation, Eye Donation camp also became successful. The idea to see the world even after death is very enchanting however, to be able to convince individuals with different religious and social backgrounds was a difficult task. However the team was able to do it with extraordinary results, with about 100 registrations from students as well as faculty members.

Evidence of Success: We managed to collect more than 50 Bottles of Blood and about 100 Eye Donation Registrations from student and faculty donors. The students have mastered the art of giving, without expecting anything in return.

Best Practice 2: JMFC and CJJD Coaching as well as training for interviews with fruitful results.

Full-fledged JMFC and CJJD coaching has been taken up sincerely with widened base of student beneficiaries. The college has always encouraged students to take up JMFC examinations sincerely and attempt the Preliminary level Examination.

The students who are successful at 'Preliminary Exams' are trained and mentored for the Mains. The success ratio of students at the 'Mains' have seen an increase in the past. Numbers of students were successful at the Mains in this year too.

For the students who are successful at the JMFC Mains, the college conducts further training in techniques for facing the interviews. A series of Mock interviews were conducted in a systematic manner. The Mock interviews were Video-graphed and detailed feedback was given to the participants by experts.

Evidence of Success: 5 students cleared the Mains and 1 of the brightest students was successful at the Interview and selected for ______.

Annexure 2: Feedback of Students

Feedback of students was collected through formal feedback forms, regarding the following aspects:

- Designed Curriculum and academic programs conducted
- Performance of the teachers and teaching techniques
- Infrastructure facilities and Learning Resources

After collection of the forms, the inputs were analysed and interpreted and actions were taken accordingly.

The various suggestions received from the students regarding Curriculum Design were examined by the teaching staff and accordingly the suggestions were made to the Parent University regarding the changes to be made. Further, after studying the inputs from the student, a need was felt to introduce choice based system and introduction of contemporary subjects like Tax Laws in the curriculum.

The performance of the teachers and teaching techniques was also one of the important aspects on which students gave their feedback. Though most of the points were positive some suggestions were noted and instructions were given to the teachers for further improvements. Teachers were directed to use more and more of newer techniques like seminars, PPTs etc in order to have more of participative learning.

Though the Students have suggested for a separate library building and open Library system, The demand for Separate Library cannot be implemented in near future, due to lack of funds, however the demand of open library system is under consideration. Also the thrust is on to provide more reference books and e-journals as demanded by the students.
